

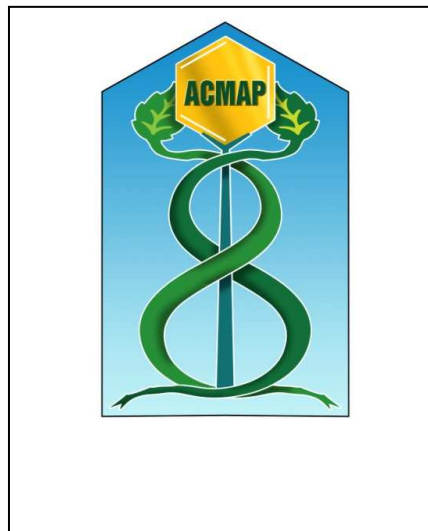
OUR HISTORY

The American Council for Medicinally Active Plants (ACMAP) has as its mission to promote and foster research, education, development, production, and conservation of medicinal, aromatic and other bioactive plants useful to human health.

The American Council for Medicinally Active Plants Inc. was established in March, 2007 when a group of interested scientists met in Warner Robins, GA, following the 1st International Symposium on Medicinal and Nutraceutical Plants of the International Society of Horticulture Science (ISHS) meeting to discuss their mutual scientific interests in plant natural products and sought to develop a forum of like-minded scientists bonded together by their interest in this field.

ACMAP functioned as an informal consortium of researchers to coordinate scientific research expertise on medicinal and aromatic plants (MAP) at educational, governmental, and private institutions to maximize the impact and visibility of scientific investigations on MAP and their bioactive components relative to human, animal and plant health.

In July, 2009 at the American Society of Horticultural Science Annual meeting in St. Louis, MO, 12 founding members decided to formalize this new organization and established ACPMAP as a scientific council. ACPMAP was officially recognized as a non-profit corporation in the state of Florida on September 1, 2009.

The Program

The 2010 annual conference will provide two days of scientific presentations delivered as oral lectures, seminars and poster contributions, a number of specialized hands-on workshops, and a third day of tours. The field tour will visit one of the Rutgers agricultural experiment stations where you will see ongoing MAP studies including herb variety trials, plant breeding with herbs, a 500 liter portable field distillation unit, walk-in herb dryer converted from the older style Powell tobacco dryers; and site visits to commercial nursery specializing in exotic MAPs from around the world and a visit to an organic botanical manufacturing facility in New Jersey.
